

ASPEN MOUNTAIN

THE CROWN JEWEL

Rising above the bustling energy of downtown Aspen, this is where it all began in 1947 with the single-seat Lift 1, which immediately became the longest chairlift in the world. More than 70 years later, Aspen remains a bucket-list ski resort for many. The main entry point to skiing or riding Aspen is the prominent Silver Queen Gondola that zips snow sports enthusiasts to the top of the mountain in under 15 minutes. Skiers and riders are then greeted with quick and easy access to over 3,000 vertical feet of terrain. Bell Mountain delivers Hollywood lines under the gondola with plenty of options for tree skiing, glades and bumps. Over on the right side of the mountain, the ‘Dumps’ supply a powder pocket haven amongst glistening Aspen trees. For speedsters, carving a turn on the iconic America’s downhill race course, host to World Cup ski racing for decades, is a must. Aspen Mountain might look small, but it skis big.

Be the first to enjoy newly groomed or fresh powder before the mountain officially opens for the day. Complimentary and available to upper-level intermediate skiers and snowboarders, ages 11 and up. To reserve, call 970-920-0755.

Snowcats take you to prime untracked stashes on the backside of Aspen Mountain where a typical day averages 10,000 vertical feet of untouched snow.

Race for a time and family glory on the public NASTAR course located on Silver Dip Swing trail.

Offered daily, a naturalist from Aspen Center for Environmental Studies will lead two-hour guided snowshoe tours from the top of the Silver Queen Gondola. Purchase tickets at any ticket window.

UPHILL POLICY Uphillers must be at the summit of Aspen Mountain by 9 am. Slope preparation, maintenance equipment and snowmobiles will be in operation at any time day or night. Keep to the sides of trails, avoid blind spots, snowmaking lines and machinery, and stay out of the way of snowcats and snowmobiles at all times. Uphill traffic will not be permitted during avalanche control. No dogs allowed.

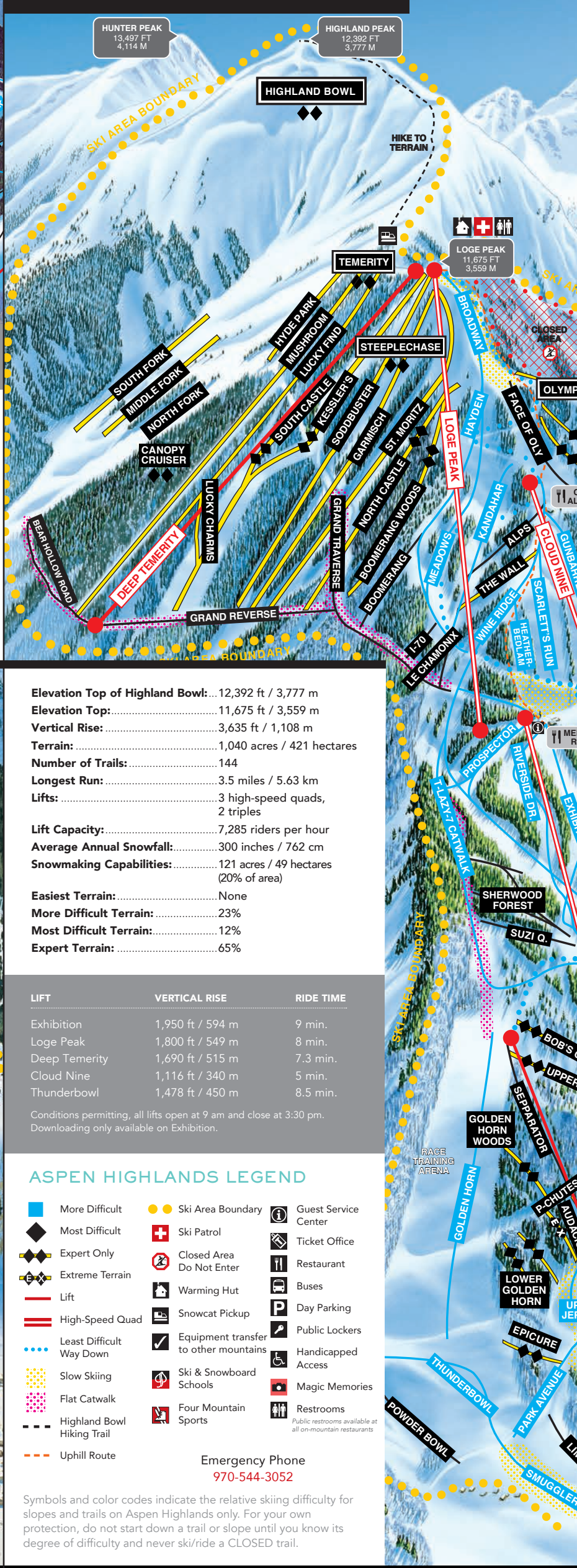
ASPEN HIGHLANDS

RAW CHARACTER

Adored by locals and elite skiers and riders, Aspen Highlands has a duct-tape-to-diamonds vibe best understood by comparing two of its most famous gems: Highland Bowl and Cloud Nine Alpine Bistro. Highland Bowl is accessed by a 45-minute hike to the top of Highland Peak, where skiers and riders are greeted by a panorama punctuated by the towering Maroon Bells and Pyramid Peak. The Bowl then delivers expansive, expert terrain extending close to 2,500 vertical feet of pure heaven. Meanwhile, Cloud Nine Alpine Bistro offers up equal parts elegance and raucous fun with an afternoon ski-in-dance-out après ski scene that is unmatched. While Highlands may be defined by those outsized experiences, there's more: a surprising amount of intermediate terrain on the lower mountain. Other perks of skiing or riding Highlands? Free hot cider or tea at the guest service station.

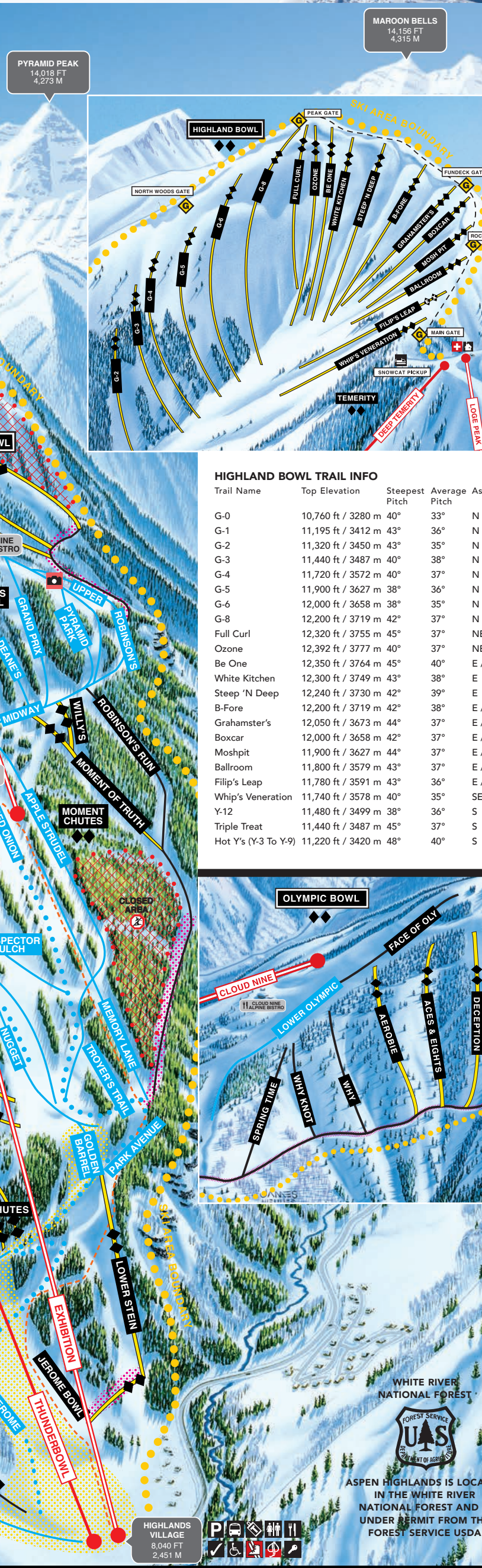

UPHILL POLICY Uphillers must be past the Merry-Go-Round restaurant by 9 am in order to proceed to the upper mountain. Keep to the sides of trails, avoid blind spots, snowmaking lines and machinery and stay out of the way of snowcats and snowmobiles at all times. Uphill traffic is only permitted on designated and marked trails. Uphill traffic will not be permitted during avalanche control. No dogs allowed.

DOGS: Dogs are not permitted on any of our four mountains during the ski/snowboard season.

SAFETY
SLOPE SAFETY
Skiing and snowboarding can be enjoyed in many ways. Always show courtesy to others and be aware that there are elements of risk in skiing. Common sense and personal awareness can help reduce accidents. Aspen Skiing Company does not permit children in child carriers or backpacks while skiing or riding on any of our four mountains. Observe your responsibility code listed below and share with other skiers and riders the responsibility for a great skiing and riding experience.

- 1. Always stay in control.
 - 2. People ahead of you have the right of way.
 - 3. Stop in a safe place for you and others.
 - 4. Whenever starting downhill or merging, look uphill and yield.
 - 5. Use devices to help prevent runaway equipment.
 - 6. Observe signs and warnings, and keep off closed trails.
 - 7. Know how to use the lifts safely.
- Be safety conscious and KNOW THE CODE. IT'S YOUR RESPONSIBILITY. This is a partial list. Officially endorsed by: NATIONAL SKI AREAS ASSOCIATION.

SKI PATROL: Please do not hesitate to ask ski patrol for help or information. Emergency phone numbers are listed in the legend for each individual mountain. Report all accidents to ski patrol immediately. Ski patrol closes the trails whenever it is deemed necessary. Respect all closed trail signs. Skiers/snowboarders shall not enter a trail that is closed. All skiers/snowboarders involved in a collision must leave their names and addresses with ski patrol.

- Know your ability level and ski/ride within it.
- Natural and man-made objects exist and may not be marked.
- Mountain operations continue during the day including snowmaking, grooming activities and the use of snowmobiles on the ski area.
- It is a violation of Colorado law to leave the scene of an accident if you are involved in a collision with another skier or rider.

HELMETS: We strongly recommend helmet usage for all skiers and snowboarders, regardless of their age or ability. Helmets are required for children/teens ages 17 and under participating in Ski & Snowboard Schools lessons and for all participants, regardless of age, in terrain park & park lessons.

EXTREME TERRAIN: Any place within the ski area boundary containing cliffs with a minimum 20-foot rise over a 15-foot run, and slopes with a minimum 50-degree average pitch over a 100-foot run.

FREESTYLE TERRAIN: Includes, but is not limited to, terrain parks and terrain park features such as jumps, rails, fun boxes and all other constructed and natural features, halfpipes, quarterpipes and bump terrain.

- TERRAIN PARK USERS' GUIDE**
 - Make a plan. Every time you use freestyle terrain, make a plan for each feature you want to use. Your speed, approach and take off will directly affect your maneuver and landing.
 - Look before you leap. Scope around the jumps first, not over them. Know landings are clear, and clear yourself out of the landing area.
 - Easy style it: Start small and work your way up.
 - Respect gets respect. From the lifeline through the park.

Jibbing is for the designated parks and appropriate features. Please respect our property and facilities.

TREE WELL AND DEEP-SNOW SAFETY: If you decide to leave the groomed trails, you are voluntarily accepting the risk of a deep-snow immersion accident. A deep-snow or tree-well immersion accident occurs when a skier or rider falls into an area of deep unconsolidated snow and becomes immobilized and suffocates. Deaths resulting from these kinds of accidents are referred to as SIS or Snow Immersion Suffocation. Visit www.nsa.org/safety-programs/tree-well-deep-snow-safety/ and become educated on how to reduce risk through your own action and awareness.

BACKCOUNTRY: Backcountry travel can be extremely dangerous and can result in serious injury or death. There is no ski patrol, avalanche control or other Ski Area Services beyond the ski area boundaries. Access to public lands beyond the ski area boundary may be made through U.S. Forest Service access points. Rescue in the backcountry is under the jurisdiction of the Pitkin County Sheriff's Office. Backcountry rescues, if available and possible, are difficult and expensive.

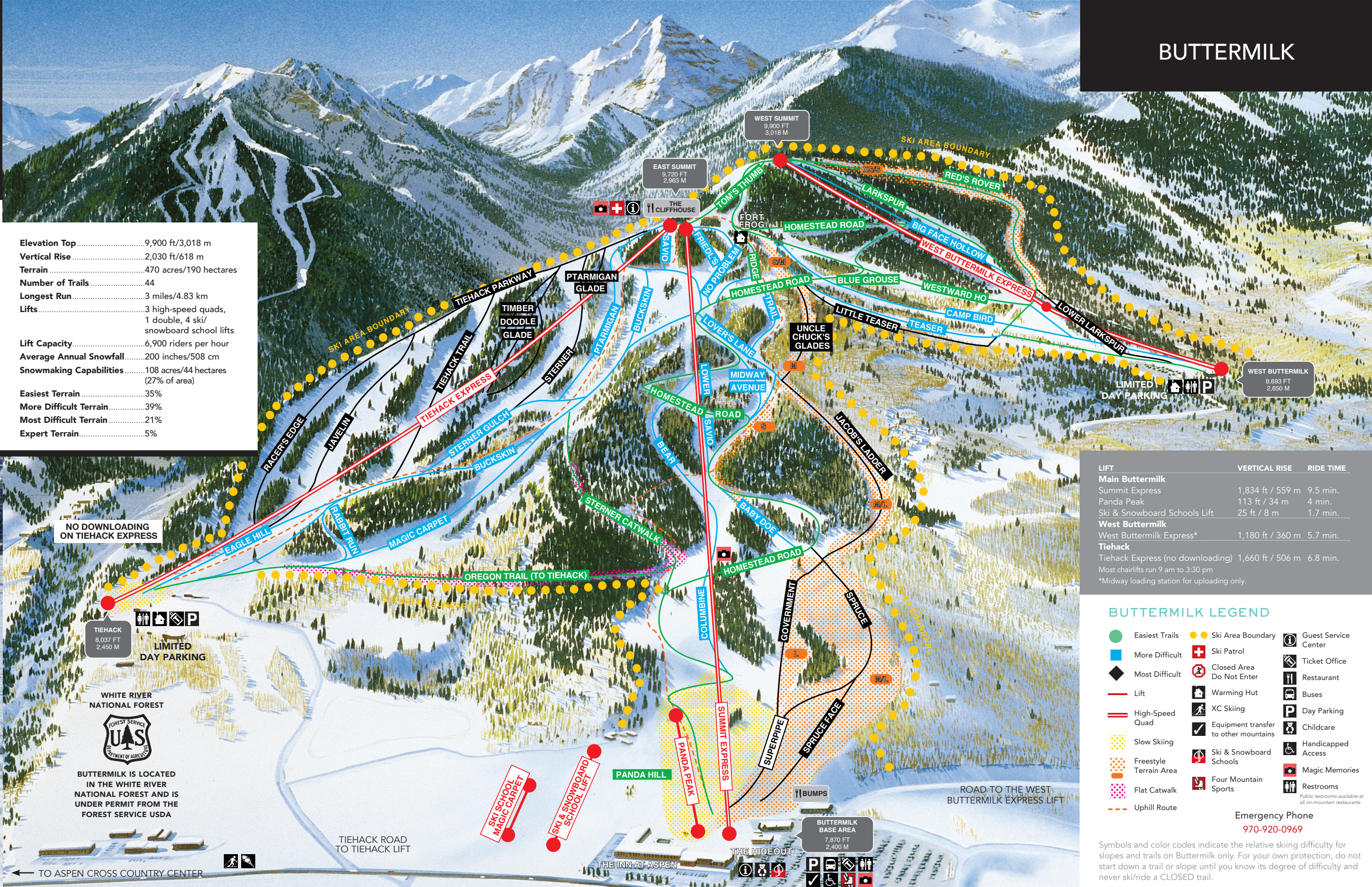
